The Laurel College Center (LCC) is a unique joint effort between Howard Community College (HCC) and Prince George's Community College (PGCC).

Located in downtown Laurel near the Laurel Shopping Center and Laurel Center Mall, the LCC seeks to make higher education accessible to anyone over the age of 16 who lives or works in the Laurel area, especially those whose home residence is in either Prince George's County or Howard County. However, anyone can take classes at the LCC, whether you have never taken a college class before, already have a college degree, want to pursue a degree program or just take a course or two for fun, regardless of where you live.

At the LCC, you can take individual courses, credit and noncredit, or you can earn an associate's degree in business administration, general studies, elementary education/special education, criminal justice or applied information technology.

The following pages list the HCC credit classes offered at the LCC in spring 2010. Workforce development and continuing education programs, which are published in a separate schedule, are also offered to help you upgrade your job skills in a variety of areas including computers, finance and management. Others are offered simply for your enjoyment and additional programs are available to assist businesses in training employees.

### **Getting Started-Admissions Procedures**

New students should complete an application for admission to HCC and submit it to the LCC or to the college's main campus. A \$25 application fee must be submitted with the application. You may obtain an application from the Web site, [www.howardcc.edu](http://www.howardcc.edu), from the LCC or from the HCC campus. You may also call 1-866-228-6110 to have one mailed to you.

Advisers come to the LCC and can meet with you to discuss your interests, provide career information and assist you with course planning and selection. They can also tell you about other services such as placement testing, financial aid and support for students with disabilities. See page 21 for a list of services and contact information.

### **Registration for Classes**

You may register in person at the LCC or on the HCC campus. Returning students may also be eligible to register by telephone, 410-715-3800, or through HCC Express, the college's online registration system. See "Step 4: Register for Classes" in this publication.

Registration for spring continues through January 29. Students are encouraged to register early, since courses are filled on a first-come, first-served basis.

### **Tuition/Fees**

Tuition is calculated according to the number of credits taken. The charge for tuition differs according to your county/state of residence. See page 12 for tables that will help calculate the cost of credit courses.

The schedule for payment of tuition appears on page 14 in this publication. Students may be dropped from their classes if the bill is not paid by the due date shown.

### **Financial Aid**

You may apply for all forms of financial aid to support your credit coursework at the LCC. Due to the complexity of determining eligibility for financial aid, you are advised to work through the Financial Aid Office on the HCC campus. However, general information on processing procedures and deadlines for financial aid are available at the LCC main office.

Students enrolling at the LCC may also participate in the college's deferred payment program, FACTS, which allows

you to spread your tuition payments over several months. Contact the financial aid office for more information.

#### Parking

During the day, you must park in the yellow-lined spaces at the Laurel Shopping Center. Take the walkway between Books-A-Million and Sprint to the LCC building. After 5 p.m. and on Saturdays, you may park in the lots adjacent to Marshall Avenue. Parking passes are not needed. Parking is free.

#### Placement Testing

For credit degree programs, a placement test is usually required to determine each first-time student's math, reading and writing proficiency level as a part of the course selection and registration process. Transfer students with prior math and English courses may not need to take the placement tests. You should meet with an adviser to determine if a placement test is needed. You can schedule a placement test by calling 410-772-4162 or 1-866-228-6110 (toll free). The tests are not available at the LCC on a walk-in basis.

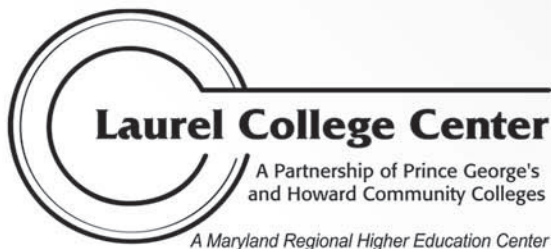

In this course, students will explore all of the primary disciplines in business on an introductory level: economics, human resource management, finance options, managerial accounting principles and marketing strategies. Students will examine challenges present in the current business environment and consider them with an eye toward ethics, social responsibility and effective management strategies in a global economy. The course is kept current by students' exposure to guest speakers and case analyses. Some written and oral reports will be required from these activities. This course is ideal both for students who wish to pursue a career in business and those who wish to gain a better understanding of the business world in which they live.

Students will obtain skills in such areas as: leadership, domestic and global business culture, strategy and decision-making, the four basic management functions, and information and operations systems management. The course will provide several opportunities to apply knowledge in individual and small group assignments and activities. This course will in-

roduce the concepts of project management and the importance of strategic vision.

This introductory course provides students with an opportunity to study law and its impact on business. Students will learn basic legal concepts and their application, build a vocabulary unique to business and the law and develop critical thinking skills that are essential to analyzing cases and making sound business decisions. The course will provide students with an opportunity to study current legal and ethical issues affecting business, contracts, sales, and the American legal system. The knowledge and skills gained from Business Law I are useful for careers in business, human resources, management, alternative dispute resolution, public policy, sales and entrepreneurship.

**CISCO****CSCO-650 Building Scalable Cisco Networks (3 credits)**

This course focuses on advanced routing using Cisco routers connected in local-area networks (LANs) and wide-area networks (WANs) typically found at medium to large network sites. Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to select and implement the appropriate Cisco IOS services required to build a scalable routed network. This course will help the student prepare for exams associated with CCNP (Cisco Certified Network Professional) certification.

**CSCO-660 Implement Secure Converged Wide-Area Network (3 credits)**

This course introduces how to provide secure enterprise-class network service for teleworkers and branch sites. Students learn how to secure and expand the reach of an enterprise network with focus on VPN configuration and securing network access. Topics include teleworker configuration and access, frame-mode MPLS, site-to-site IPSEC VPN, Cisco EXVPN, strategies to

mitigate network attacks, Cisco device hardening, and IOS firewall features. This course prepares students to pass one of the CCNP Certification Exams, #642-825.

**COMPUTER SYSTEMS****CMSY-106 Personal Computer Systems Repair II (3 credits)**

Students will acquire a basic technical understanding of the function and operation of the major peripheral devices such as state-of-the-art data storage devices, display technology, printers, scanners, SCSI devices, multimedia devices, modems, and local area network devices. Emphasis will be placed on localizing and correcting common hardware problems, installing, configuring, maintaining, and testing PC systems. The student will also learn IRQ conflict resolution, I/O address setting, DMA channel conflict resolution, optimizing memory, fine tuning autoexec.bat, config.sys files and Windows initializing files (.ini files) and configuring systems with Windows. This course, along with the CMSY-105 prerequisite, prepares students for the hardware level of A+ certification offered by the Computing Industry Association.

Students should be familiar with Windows file management before enrolling in this course.

**ECONOMICS**

**ECON-101 Principles of Economics (Macro) (3 credits)**

This course introduces students to important economic issues which affect an entire economy. Students will more comfortably read and understand books, newspapers, and magazines with economic content. Topics include Demand and Supply Theory; Gross Domestic Product Determination; inflation; unemployment; the role of the government and public

choice; fiscal and monetary policy and international economics.

Micro Economics introduces students to economic decision making at the individual firm, consumer and industry level. It is not necessary to take ECON-101 before ECON-102.

Instruction will focus on theories of child development, research methods, and developmental milestones. Knowledge learned in this course can be applied to parenting and to careers in early childhood and elementary education, and nursing. ENGL-121 guides students through the expository writing process through close reading of contemporary critical discourse and teaches the rhetorical arts of argument and persuasion through critical thinking, reading and research. Students will develop an understanding of themselves as readers and writers of culture as they participate in public discourse about writing; examine the relationship among writer, audience, and purpose; and practice writing prose through a recursive process. Students completing this course should be able to write persuasive, researched and documented essays (of at least 1,000 words) demonstrating the conventions of standard written English and manuscript presentation.

### MATH-067 Review of Algebra With Geometry Applications (4 credits)

In this course, the student will develop skills in manipulating algebraic expressions with integer exponents and in simplifying polynomials, rational expressions and radicals. The student will write an equation for a line from given information. Systems of equations will be solved graphically and algebraically. Methods of factoring second-degree polynomials and applications involving factoring will also be included. Students will solve quadratic equations and related applications using factoring and the quadratic formula. Application problems will include the use of the Theorem of Pythagoras. Classes offered in HR326 A&B and HR328 are computer-based instruction. Additional time is required in the computer lab. Taking the essence of reason to be argument—a set of premises supporting a conclusion—the basic notions of validity, truth, soundness, strength and cogency will be studied and applied to ordinary language, culminating in a survey of what are known as informal fallacies. Two elements of formal symbolic logic will then be studied and practiced: categorical syllogism (Aristotelian and Boolean) and propositional logic (not including predicate logic). These elements have a distinctly mathematical feel; the final element of the course will return to a less formally rigorous study of inductive logic, scientific method and reason in general.
